A gallery in Jaffa's flea market gives new life to design pieces.

It seems that every single day, the wide-reaching arms of technology embrace a larger part of our lives. At the same time, the globe, which was once huge and so diverse, seems to shrink all the time. Whether they like it or not, everyone knows that things are moving

Those who look forward feel excited about all the conveniences about to reach the tips of our fingers. Those who choose to look back, like Eran Ben-Baroch, provide a bridge between what was and what will be.

Ben-Baroch is by nature a collector, the host of a foster home for unwanted goods. He has spent the better part of his life in Jaffa's famous flea market, looking through the stalls for hidden diamonds. He is the owner of the gorgeous Vintage Gallery. He sells renovated antique furniture, and is a true encyclopedia of past and present interior designers.

Most days, Ben-Baroch can be found busy around his shop, speaking with customers and arranging the displays. Vintage Gallery is the largest store of its kind in the country. Ben- Baroch and his associates specialize in giving new life to design pieces whose best days seem to be behind them. The store has a staff of carpenters and upholsterers, who fix and renew even the worst cases.

A couple of years ago, Ben-Baroch recognized that a change was taking place in the profile of market shoppers. It was the "renaissance of the flea market." It included the opening of designer clothes and shoe stores and expensive gourmet restaurants. Ben-Baroch joined Avi Cohen and Gilad Moshkatel to open a store called *Items*. Items offers the buyer who knows vintage well, a more affordable way to get their favorite, famous designs. The new store sells high quality reproductions of world famous designs such as the egg chair from A Clockwork Orange. It also sells the American design label White On White, which has a country, organic feel to it.

Ben-Baroch invites the public to see samples of Israel's lost art form, ceramics. Over the past several weeks, he has carefully put together an exhibition. He is an avid collector of all things clay and has a stock that tells the story of his country's tragically lost love affair with the craft.

In the 1930s, a few factories began to make modernday pots and pans painted by talented local artists. For the next 50 years this industry developed. Companies such as Na'aman, Harsa, Lapid and Beit Hayotzer became common names as well as symbols of elegance.

Then, in the 1980s, more and more ceramics were being brought in from abroad and companies took a serious hit. The public was no longer interested in local goods, as foreign became chic.

Behind each piece in the collection is a fascinating story, which connects to the history of Israel, he explained. "Each one is decorated and painted in a way that is unique to the piece, which gives it the magic and honor of being one of a kind."
